We have completed the 2015 Field Day adventure, with really wonderful participation from many club members. Having a few more members participate in the set-up and tear down sure makes the process go faster and smoother.

This year we started the new trailer loading on Thursday June 25th. Making use of the new main tent coffin, built by Nate Seidler, KC9TSO. It worked out extremely well and allowed for some two level packing that gave us the room to get almost everything loaded into the one club trailer. Now with the Field Day site just 3-4 miles from the storage shed, the trip is quite easy! The main tent was up by about 6:00 PM and all the coolers unloaded and inside the tent. At that point it was unsure if we would have

enough tables and chairs for the Friday night Turkey Dinner cooked by Stand and Nancy, but it all worked out fine.

The Ozaukee Radio Club ran a 4A classification using the call sign W9GA, Thank You Ken Boston for letting the club use your call. We will hear the calculated score in another day or two, very interested to see how it ended up.

Last month I mentioned the tower donated to the club by Jane Rediske. Dave Carpenter, KC9REP and his sons have decided to take it down. Dave has a strong background with towers and antennas, since that is one of the skills required in his business. He got down the beam and rotor, and sometime after the July 4th weekend the tower will be coming down. He will need some help, so please consider offering Dave and his sons a hand when the call comes through. Both of Dave's sons are also licensed Amateur Radio operators!

I have another project going, and yes, it does make use of vacuum tubes, just like most of my gear. I acquired a HP 410B Vacuum Tube RF Voltmeter and I am in the process of restoring it. I got it on eBay for about 50% of their typical price and it is now in the process of being refinished. HP used wrinkle finish paint and I have used a two step process to restore the cabinet. It has worked out very well. It is all ready to be re-assembled and then calibrated, but so far all looks good!

DX'ing & Contesting

July is a pretty slow month in radio. People have outdoor activities and radio propagation on the high bands tends to be down while static noise is high on the low bands. I tend to be pretty non-radio active in July. I still have not put the station back together after Field Day!

The one big contest this month is the IARU contest. It starts at 7:00AM local on Saturday July 11 and runs for 24 hours. Unfortunately this is the same weekend as the South Milwaukee hamfest, one of my favorites.

You work everyone in this which makes it fun. The exchange is a signal report and your ITU zone. This

is not the same as our CQ zone which is 4. Our ITU zone is 8.

There are special IARU headquarter stations on. They will send a signal reports and the abbreviation for their member society (ARRL, RSGB, etc.).

You can work phone only, CW only or mixed mode. There are high, low and QRP power categories within each mode classification. You can work the same station again on different bands or different modes on the same band.

Contacts with stations in the same zone are worth 1 point. Contacts in different zones but the same continent are worth 3 points, and contacts in different continents are worth 5 points. Multipliers are the zones worked on each band, plus HQ stations worked.

You may recall that last year the World Radio Team Championship was held during this contest. Two operator teams from all over the world came to New England to compete. They operated from tents out in the country from low noise locations. Each station had identical antennas. The idea is that the winner would be determined by skill and no team would have an advantage because of better equipment or location.

They all were assigned 1X1 calls at the last moment so no one outside would know who was who and skew the results by working only their friends. If you got on for this last year you should have received stacks of QSL cards a month or so ago. I have about 50 of them on the operator table.

The other interesting contest is the RTTY weekend of the North American QSO Party on July 18. It starts at 1800UTC (1:00 local) and runs for 12 hour but you can only operate 10 hours. The exchange is your name and state.

One thing I like about the NAQPs is that they are short, and you can't run more than 100 watts. Being a domestic contest small antennas can be effective. They are great contests for smaller

stations. The CW and phone weekends are next month. They run the series again in the winter. I have operated at least a few hours in all the NAQPs the last couple of years.

DXpeditions are light in July as usual. There are a number of vacation style operations planned to not terribly rare locations. There are a couple that stick out though.

A group of Finnish hams are going to visit a couple of islands. The first is a group of American hams going to the Faroe Islands as OY/home call from July 8-15.

The other one is to Market Reef as OJ0S July 11-18 by a group of Finnish hams. These are not real rare but you don't hear them on every day either. They might be a good opportunity to pick up a couple of new band countries.

That wraps up DXing and Contesting for July.

Editors note:

I would like to start a table of member stations and the number of country contacts they have on each band. Interested? Is so send me your unconfirmed and confirmed totals on each band. It could give us all some targets. Should be some competitive fun.

The Computer Corner

No. 209. FIELD DAY IS OVER!

Yes, it has come and gone. This is being written on 2Jul, just a couple of days after the end, and insofar as I am aware the network worked fine, with one glitch. Our switch (similar to a router; it routes the data coming in from all the station cables into the main computer) uses 110 VAC. I had it on an uninterruptible power supply (UPS) so that it would continue with good power during the few minutes when the generator was being refilled with gas. Well, the UPS internal battery went bad! No sweat. I had a spare. After plugging in the spare, its internal battery died too! So, we pulled the UPS out of the system and went straight with generator power. It worked fine. The switch was powered down only for a total of about 4 seconds,

while changing and removing the UPSs. We lost no data that we know of, and we can check that by comparing the data on each of the station computers with the master data on the main computer. So all is good. Do I know how we did? Not yet. Our data cruncher Zach Yatso (KC9ZNR) will report on that later.

Many of you know that I farm the ORC laptop computers out to members after Field Day is over. That is, computers should not lie on a shelf unused for the 10 months when they are not being prepared for Field Day or actually used for it. Therefore, I loan them to members who can use them. There are several "rules of use" that go with the loan. They must be plugged in at all times (unless you are using them temporarily on your patio or other site where no AC power is available). This is so the power supply can keep the battery charged (laptop batteries can easily be ruined by letting them run down). They must have access to the Internet, via cable or wire-lessly, at least once a week for several hours so they can update. They must be returned promptly when called for, usually late April or early May. This is to give us time to digitally clean them up and fit them with any new software. So, if you can use a free laptop for ten months, make it to the next (July) meeting. They will be released to those who want one on a first come/first served basis. They are very nice little machines, with lots of memory, and they use a version of XP that is valid to 2019, so they will update automatically. They also have a current virus scanner and other useful utility programs installed.

When you return the laptop next spring, you will return it to Zach rather than to me. Zach has agreed to be our new Network Guru for Field Day. I introduced computer logging some years ago, followed by logging via a network, and now it is time for someone else to take over. It will be nice to see what Zach's expertise brings to the activity in future years. Thanks, Zach, for volunteering!
